Sanford W. Pickett of Prince William, aged 77 years, states he is the grandson of Harriet Clowe's mother and was raised by her from "my infancy. I was born Sept. 30, 1799." Harriet Clowe's maiden name was Wyatt. Dated 28 Oct. 1876.

William Cottrell: Luther J. Cottrell and Benjamin Cottrell, children of William Cottrell in 160 acres of a land warrant. Luther J. Cottrell being 21 years of age in Aug. 1856 and Benjamin Cottrell being 21 years of age in December 1858.

Henry Crump: Soldier's Declaration from City of Richmond, dated 5 August 1856. Henry Crump, aged 60, was a Private in Company commanded by Capt. David Glass . . . that he volunteered from New Kent County at Camp Bottom Bridge about 25 Sept. 1814. John Clark and John Frayser regidents of Hanover County signed affadavi as to the identity of Henry Crump.

Robert Crump died about 40 years ago (no date shown on memo) in New Kent and left his property to his son, Anderson Crump and wife, as long as they both live. Henry Crump is a grandson. Elizabeth Crump was mother of Henry who was the wife of Jesse Crump. Elizabeth Crump has had six children. Henry Crump has married Elizabeth C. Rayland of New Kent.

Joshua P. Crump: Margaret Crump, widow, who was living at Charlotte County Courthouse in 1878. Before her marriage she was Margaret Clark. Joshua P. Crump died at Charlotte C.H. 9 Sept. 1844, and Margaret his widow, has not remarried.

Jeremiah Cobb: (Lieut.) Elizabeth Cobb, widow. Assigned warrant 7 June 1853 in Southampton Co. before William H. Nicholson, J.P. Attest by William W. Cobb and John Cobb. (No relationship stated).

John Cobb: Frances Cobb, his widow.

Alexander Cockburn: Widow's Declaration from the City of Richmond, 1855. Nancy Cockburn, widow of Alexander, was a resident of Richmond City. Her husband volunteered in Hanover County 23 August 1814. She was married to Alexander Cockburn in Hanover County [16 Dec. 1816] and was Nancy Nixon, widow, before her marriag to him. Her husband died in Hanover in December 1826 and she has not remarried. Nancy died intestate leaving no children under 21 years on 3 March 1855. The warrant was assigned by Thomas Nixon, Administrator, on 22 July 1858 for the purpose of making sale of said Warrant.
