Magazines was shortly afterward moved back again to New London in consequence of Lord Cornwallis' retreat down towards York and he still remained as a guard until the expiration of three months from the time he commenced the service as a guard. That Capt Irish had the command of the Magazine and Capt Butter commanded the guard that he served out the term of three months for which he first engaged but received no discharge. That he again entered the service in 1782 as a private under Capt Richardson a Mr Grays Lieutenant as a substitute for John P. Kerins who was mustered into the service in New York County and marched down to York and there remained until discharged but the length of time he was engaged in the service this last time he cannot say but is confident it was not less than six or eight weeks when they were discharged. That he never received any written discharge and has no documentary evidence of his service. In each of the periods spoken of by him he was in the service of the United States in the revolutionary War against the British. That he does not remember the names of the other officers of the army with whom he served. That he served in the staff of

Virginia and resided there until the year 1795
when he removed to Kentucky and has resided in
Kentucky ever since and now resides in Hart
County Kentucky. This applicant further states that he
knows of no one in this country by whom he can
prove his services or any part thereof except General
Dawson and no record by him there is contained
in his affidavit hereafter to be filed as part of
this application. He hereby relinquishes every
claim whatever to a pension or annuity except
the present and declares that his name is not on
the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State or of any
other - I now to and subscribe the day and
year aforesaid

The court examined the applicant Joshua Brumf.
upon the interrogatories proposed by the Board of Review to the
first. He answered that he was born in New Kent County
Virginia in the month of May 1765 and had never
had in his possession a record of his age. To the third he
answered that he resided in Bedford County Virginia
when he entered the service and had resided since the
war as stated in his declaration and now resides
in Hart County Kentucky. To the fourth he stated
that he was called in to the service & served as stated
in his declaration. He further stated that he did
not recollect the names of any of the officers with whom
he served except those stated in his declaration.

On the 11th day of September 1832 personally appeared now in Bishop
in Open Court before the Justices thereof Joshua Crump
aged ~~ninety eight~~ ^{eighty five} years, who being first duly sworn according to law
doth on his oath make the following declaration in order
to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June
of the 1832

That he entered the Service of the
United States in Bedford County Virginia under Capt
John Galloway of the light horse in the year 1780 as
well as he now recollects, that he rendezvoused at Peters-
burg Virginia and there remained until we were
discharged but the length of time he was detain-
ed there he cannot certainly say tho he believes
it was about two months. Our Lieutenant's name
was William Galloway. At Petersburg we were
under the Command of General Lanson that

he entered the Service also named as a volunteer
and does not remember the other officers who
Commanded it. That he entered the Service
again as a substitute he believes in the year 1781
but for whom he substituted himself he cannot
now recollect that he was marched to New-
London Campbell County Virginia to assist in
guarding the magazine at that place and there
remained a short time when the Magazine was
removed into Botetourt County and he removed
with it still acting as a guard. That said

State of Kentucky, Fayette County, etc.

On this 16th day of May 1833 personally appeared before
me a justice of the peace for Fayette county Kentucky
Joshua Crump of said county, who being by me duly sworn
according to law, deposed and said, that by reason of
old age and the consequent loss of memory he cannot
swear positively to the precise length of time he served
as a soldier of the American Revolution but according
to the best of his recollection, he served not less than
the periods mentioned below and in the following grades

For two months I served in the first tour mentioned in
my declaration as a private soldier, under Captain
Ballou - For three months I served in the second tour
guarding the magazine of the country as a private soldier,
as mentioned in my original declaration - For two
months I served in the third and last expedition or tour men-
tioned in my declaration as a private soldier also -

I served also, some other tours against the forces for
which service is however I make no claim - but for the
three tours above stated amounting in all to not less
than seven months. I claim a pension from
the Government. Sworn to and subscribed the day
and date above named before
me a justice of the peace for Joshua Crump
said county of Fayette state
of Kentucky -

On this 16th day of May 1833 before Alexander Gardner
and George J. Moore Esq; came personally before me and
being duly sworn according to law, stated
that they are now & have been for many years
particular acquaintances with Joshua Crump Esq; who
resides in Fayette county Kentucky, and that they believed
him to be ~~sixty eight~~ years of age or thereabouts
and further from the modesty of Squire Crump they
have not had much talk of his having been a soldier
of the Revolution, yet from his statements on oath or
otherwise of the fact, we have no doubt he did serve

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the record of Joshua Crump, of Virginia, born about 1764, pensioned in Hart County, Kentucky, and died after 1840, also, the record of William Crump, both soldiers of the Revolutionary War.

There is no claim for pension or bounty land on file based upon service in the Revolution of the William Crump described by you. Such claims are the source of Revolutionary War data furnished by this office.

You are furnished herein the record of the only soldier named Joshua Crump found in the Revolutionary War records of this office, the data of which were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S. 30352, based upon his service in the Revolution.

Joshua Crump was born in May, 1765, in New Kent County, Virginia; the names of his parents are not shown.

While residing in Bedford County, Virginia, he volunteered in 1780 and served two months as private in Captain John Galloway's Virginia company. He enlisted in 1781, served as private in Captain Butler's Virginia company, engaged in guarding the magazine which was located first at New London, Campbell County, Virginia, then moved to Botetourt County, same state, length of tour three months. He enlisted in 1782 as a substitute for one John P. Crump, (relationship not stated) and served six or eight weeks as private in Captain Richardson's Virginia company.

The soldier resided in the State of Virginia until 1783 when he moved to Kentucky.

Joshua Crump was allowed pension on his application executed September 11, 1832, while a resident of Hart County, Kentucky. He

was still living there in 1833.

No reference was made in the claim to wife or children.

In order to obtain date of last payment of pension, the name of the person paid and possibly the date of death of Joshua Grump, you should write to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following:
